IV. Establishment Morality Has Determined the Ebb and Flow of British & American History: America's British Culture

It is interesting to observe the fact that many of the foundational principles of our inherited British culture are taken from the Order and Spiritual Codes of the Mosaic Law.

I'd like to document the importance of this fact by quoting two consummate historians on the subject, Dr. Eric von Kuehnelt-Leddihn and Dr. Russell Kirk.

Following that development, I will then note what has occurred in our society as a result of the decline of that culture due to the consistent censorship of its biblically-based establishment underpinnings.

Why are the Evangelicals [Protestants] so far more disciplined than the Catholics-why do their trains run on time? Why have they been the harbingers of technological civilization, of modern commercialism, which requires such rigorous obedience, punctuality, and coordination?

It is not the ecclesiastical structures that have formed and fashioned the mentalities and minds of people, but the respective theologies.

In the areas of industry and commerce, in the natural sciences and in military proficiency, the Evangelical nations visibly eclipsed the Catholic ones. Capitalism did not gain momentum until the Reformation. Only (then) did free enterprise "take off"; the notion (taken from the Old Testament) that prosperity is a token of divine grace acted as a powerful psychological incentive.

Eventually the Catholic nations. were left behind: in mixed areas the Evangelical element took a front seat economically: it was favored not only by the free development of capitalism, but also by its work ethic.

MAJOR POINT: The thing which has caused the United States to enjoy maximum prosperity and establish an environment of order, justice and freedom for its people is Protestant theology.
