

**Exodus: Logistical Grace Guaranteed; 'The Righteous Never Forsaken'**

Logistical grace support is a divine provision which finds its source in the justice of God.

God has promised from His righteousness to supply all the believer's needs during his sojourn in the Devil's world. This promise is a righteous standard based on the imputation of divine righteous to anyone who believes in Jehovah Elohim for salvation.

If you possess the righteousness of God then righteousness is free to sustain you in time. Justice being our point of contact with the essence of God becomes the source of the imputation of logistical grace in time.

The concept of logistical supply involves the guarantee of life support on a day-by-day basis. Thus, whenever the exigencies of the Devil's world challenge the logistical stability of the believers' life, the integrity of God must insure an unbroken supply line. It doesn't matter what day it is. Whenever there is a threat, divine righteousness demands a solution from divine justice.

On this particular day, Pharaoh is the exigency which the Jews are helpless to manage. A miracle is needed to insure continued life support for the Jewish people and continuation of the plan of God for their lives.

A principle emerges: breaks in your logistical supply line are limited in endurance. Pharaoh arrives on the scene today; God provides a solution today.

The Jews had failed miserably, they had turned against Moses and Aaron, and they had mentally returned to slavery. Logistics, however, are not contingent upon the successes or the failures of believers but upon divine integrity.

There is absolutely no system, no force, no circumstance which can permanently cut off your daily provisions until God is ready to take you home.
