

IV. Establishment Morality Has Determined the Ebb and Flow of British & American History: Kirk and Lukacs

MAJOR POINT: [Chapter 1] Develops the process through which Christian morals are incorporated into the thinking of a people. This thought is reflected in culture and develops into a civilization with a common Zeitgeist.

MAJOR POINT: [Chapter 2] Illustrates that even though individuals within a civilization may not all subscribe to the same theology, or to any theology at all, the entire population willingly submits to the rules of common culture which establishment morality created.

3. Multiculturalism, which insists that the moral values of one culture may not be considered superior to those of another, has assaulted the biblically-based establishment principles of our culture resulting in a loss of order in our society.
